A Note from Pace

This past Sunday, from when I am writing this the early morning of April 30th coffee in hand, Valley of Peace celebrated with Declan, Leo, and Max their Third Grade Bible Milestone. Each third grader received a Bible, some stickers and highlighters and other fun things, and then were prayed over in worship during the Children's Faith Moment. I told the third graders when we met before worship that the Bible Milestone is probably my favorite milestone that we celebrate in the life of the church. I just love giving people a Bible, talking about how the Bible is the Word of God, and then equipping them with the tools to read and engage with the Bible on their own and also in community.

I am a Luther scholar, and to be a Luther scholar more than having to be familiar with Latin and German, more than having read his reforming works like The 95 Theses or Freedom of a Christian, one needs to first and foremost read the Bible. One of Martin Luther's most outstanding claims when he initiated his reforming movement of the church was that the Bible should be both the starting point and the norm for our tradition. Luther said, for instance, "The Scriptures are the cradle (or manger) in which the Christ lies" and "The Bible is alive, it speaks to me; it has feet, it runs after me; it has hands, it takes hold of me... an ordinary person armed with Scripture is to be believed above a pope or a cardinal without it." The Bible is a big deal to Luther and to Lutherans.

But given our contemporary society where there are Christians who use the Bible as a source for harmful views about creation, about the LGBTQIA+ community, or who use the Bible as a textbook from which the sciences are to be judged and normed, who claim that "any Bible believing Christian" would be on their side on these issues, it is important to clarify just what Lutherans mean when we say the Bible is central to our faith.

To any Lutheran I encounter who wants guidance on what we believe about the Bible, I recommend the book Opening the Book of Faith: Lutheran Insights for Bible Study by Diane Jacobson, Mark Allan Powell, and Stanley N. Olson. It's short, around 100 pages, but it contains a wealth of information. But to put it simply and to answer the questions I most commonly get about the Bible and Lutheran's relationship to it, especially compared to the array of other denominations and the "Bible believing" Christians who claim Lutherans aren't Bible believing enough, here are a few things I usually say Lutherans believe about the Bible.

First, when asked if we read the Bible literally, I go to this quote from Opening the Book of Faith: "I believe the literal parts literally. And I believe the metaphorical parts metaphorically. When the Bible says, The Lord is my Shepherd' (Psalm 23) I believe that, but I don't believe it literally. If the Lord were literally my Shepherd then wouldn't I have to be a literal sheep? And I'm not" (21). The Bible is not a textbook. The point of the many books of the Bible isn't to tell us with scientific accuracy the origin of the cosmos or the horticultural truth of things like when Jesus says "the mustard seed is the smallest of all the seeds" (Mark 4:31--it's not, the orchid seed is smaller).

A Note from Pace Continued

That brings me to the next point, which is people will often ask if the Bible is inerrant, a fancy word to mean that everything in the Bible is to be taken as literal truth. There are many ways to counter this claim, for instance, the Bible contradicts itself quite a bit. A book written over the course of several thousand years by hundreds of authors and then translated into languages very different from its original languages of course would have some contradictions and inaccuracies. But my favorite thing is something one of my seminary professors, Marty Stevens, told us. She said, "We don't believe that the Bible is inerrant on matters of science, but we do believe the Bible is 100% true in showing us God's relationship with humanity." As I quoted Luther above as saying, the scriptures are the cradle for the Word of God—Jesus—to be laid. It shows us Jesus, it points us to God, but it does not and should not replace Jesus. Or to quote from Opening the Book of Faith again, "I hope you love the Bible, but remember this—the Bible will never love you back. Jesus will. It is Jesus who loves you, not the Bible. You cannot have a relationship with the Bible. You can have a relationship with Jesus" (32).

The last thing I'll say is that Lutherans are encouraged to read the Bible on our own, to dive deep into its stories and read about the promises therein. But, for Luther and Lutherans around the world, that cannot and should not ever replace hearing the Word of God in community. Luther spoke again and again about the importance of hearing God's word: hearing the Bible stories in church read out loud, hearing the truths of the stories proclaimed from the pulpit, and most importantly, hearing the promises made alive for us.

Perhaps that is the most important thing about what Luther and Lutherans around the world believe about the Bible: it is an invitation for all to "listen with us." Listen to the promises, listen to the challenges, listen to the sorrows and heartbreaks and joys and comfort. Listen with us to the Word of God, experience it with us in the sacraments of communion and baptism, and live the Word of God in service to a world in need, hungry for those promises. Listen with us.

A Note from the Racial Justice Team

Now that the temps are warming up and green leaves are popping out, perhaps you're feeling ready to come out of winter hibernation. Do you have an itch to explore a new place or try something different from your usual everyday activities? The Racial Justice Team has a few suggestions for you!

I. Visit Hocokata Ti. A few of us from VoP and other Wildfire churches visited on April 6, and we highly recommend it! An easy drive to Shakopee, Hocokata Ti is the cultural center and gathering space for the Shakopee Mdewakanton Sioux Community's tribe members. Their public exhibit, Mdewakanton: Dwellers of the Spirit Lake, offers visitors an opportunity to learn more about the culture and history of the Dakota people in Minnesota. Starting with their creation story, you will notice and ponder many similarities to our Biblical creation story. As you wander through the interactive displays and colorful artifacts, you'll realize how much you didn't learn in your history class at school. There's also a lovely gift shop and library to browse as well. Check out www.hocokatati.org to plan your visit and bring the kids or grandkids – my eleven-year-old is asking when we can go back!

2. Visit the Minnesota History Center in St. Paul. You can continue your learning about Native culture and history with their exhibits, Our Home: Native Minnesota and Reframing Our Stories. Through photographs, maps, artifacts, and stories, you'll have the opportunity to connect with their experience of survival, resilience, and adaptation. Also, on display through June 9, you can visit the exhibit, Black Citizenship in the Age of Jim Crow, to learn about the history of the African American fight for full citizenship and racial equality in the 50 years following the Civil War. For more information, visit www.mnhs.org.

3. Attend the Racial Healing Circle: White Allies event at the Penumbra Theatre on July 20. The circle event will include food, fellowship, facilitated conversation, and a wellness offering to support personal and collective transformation. May Mission of the Month: Loaves & Fishes

Since the 1980's, Valley of Peace has been supporting and participating in Loaves and Fishes. This organization provides free community meals, to anyone in need. Currently, Valley of Peace participates on the second Wednesday of each month, with two teams rotating every other month. Our volunteers help with some food prep, with filling food containers and with delivering the food containers to people as they simply drive up to the church. We work and serve out of Brunswick United Methodist Church in Crystal, helping out folks with 60-85 meals each time.

Every Meal is the week-end food program for Noble School supported by VOP and two partner churches. This program offers five culturally diverse food choices that the families can sign-up for through the school. The food bags are distributed every Friday during the school year. Valley of Peace supports this ministry with volunteers and also with financial giving. The cost per child is about \$370.00/ for 40 weeks and right now we have 39 children in the program. Along with our partner churches, we commit funds every year to help off -set the cost of the program.

Food insecurity is real for families in our community and Every Meal is a way for all of us to help the families at Noble School. We are hoping through Mission of the Month we can continue to fund this very important ministry.
