

## The Burning, by Tim Madigan

"I began to suspect that a crucial piece remained missing from America's long attempts at racial reconciliation," Madigan wrote in 2001 in the author's note to *The Burning*. "Too many in this country remained as ignorant as I was. Too many were just as oblivious to some of the darkest moments in our history, a legacy of which Tulsa is both a tragic example and a shameful metaphor. How can we heal when we don't know what we're healing from?"

### A RACIAL JUSTICE REFLECTION

The annual recognition of the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Inauguration of the 47<sup>th</sup> President of the United States of America both fell on Monday, January 20 of this year. The contrast between the two observations could hardly be more dramatic. Many articles and editorials reflected on the significance of these events

falling on the same day. As we enter February, with its focus on African American History, I share with you an excerpt from one such article for your consideration and pondering. The essay is entitled **Creative** 

#### **Non-Conformist**

(An edited version of my MLK speech) by Eddie Glaude, Jr., who writes at a native son, his blog page on Substack.

"As we stand on the eve of the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the nation, we must say no to those who clamor for the days of old, when people like me supposedly knew our place. We must say no to those who want to shudder the doors of institutions of higher learning to a diverse student body. We must say no to those who long for the days of the 19th century and explicit empire. We must say no to a kind of nostalgia that arrests our imaginations and, instead, fight for the America we want, for the world we desire where every human being has standing and dignity.

Despite the howling winds, despite the depression that threatens to overwhelm, we must be creative non-conformists and hold off our elegant despair.

What does it mean to have Dr. King and the movement that made him shadow Donald Trump's inauguration. It is a startling representation of two Americas, and the choice that confronts each of us. Which America will you choose? Whose legacy will you claim?"

## WORSHIP AT TAPESTRY – MARCH 16, 2025

(From the Racial Justice Committee)

In March of 2024, Pastor Melissa and Deacon Josue Gonzalez, from Tapestry Ministry, visited Valley of Peace. They shared about their ministry community during our Adult Faith Formation and then brought the Word for the sermon in worship. On **Sunday, March 16**, we plan to worship at their community. Tapestry worships at 5:00pm each Sunday and invite us to stay for dinner following worship. They are located at 7045 Lyndale Ave So, Richfield (Oak Grove Lutheran Church). Mark your calendar now for this chance to build relationships across cultures through our shared faith tradition.

Here's a brief description of Tapestry and their multicultural ministry:

Guided by the Spirit and led by Creator God, <u>Tapestry</u> shares the love of Jesus through **food**, **music**, and **education**. We build bridges and provide opportunities for people to cross them with those different from themselves.

#### Food

Because some of our best conversations happen over a meal, Tapestry's Sunday evening worship has always been followed by dinner. We are people from Bolivia, Cameroon, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Puerto Rico, the United States, and Venezuela, with eight teams that serve food after worship. Tapestry also serves homemade food during Community Meals before Spanish and English classes on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

#### Music

The Tapestry Band just completed a year-long project with a grant from the <u>Calvin Institute of Worship</u>. Musicians composed 12 new songs (10 of which have been recorded so far) that will be available soon to listen to and to use as recordings in worship! These talented musicians are from Puerto Rico, the United States, and Venezuela and songs are in English and/or Spanish! The band is often available to lead worship and other events with a large repertoire of music from the ELW, ACS, LLC, our original music, and other songs played with Latin rhythms!

#### **Education**

Tapestry began teaching Spanish and English (ESL) courses in 2017 and has continued to share this ministry with the Church and the community! These courses help us learn about each other, our cultures, hopes, dreams, joys, and

struggles through language learning. Our teachers come from the Tapestry community, and it is a joy to be able to teach and learn from each other!

In addition, Tapestry offers Bible study led by Deacon Josue Gonzalez every Wednesday.

Tapestry was blessed to celebrate 10 years of ministry in September, 2024, with an ecumenical conference that included leaders from various Latin American countries along with a special worship service, both featuring Dr. Sandra Montes, author of <u>Becoming Real and Thriving in Ministry</u>. We give thanks for this wonderful gift of a loving and gracious God.

#### Feb 2: Faith and Religion in Art, with Barb Mikelson

Dan Johnson will be hosting a video viewing which includes the late Huston Smith, one of the world's most knowledgeable people on world religions. After the video we will have time for reflection and discussion.

## Feb 23: Growing up in a Christian Family in Taiwan, with Hsu-hui Wang

Hsu-hui will open with a brief history of Christianity in Taiwan followed by her own personal reflections.

#### **VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES**

PRISM has a variety of opportunities to get involved. Check out all the different ways to volunteer with them below.

**Front Desk:** The Front Desk Volunteer is the critical first point of contact with participants. Front Desk volunteers welcome participants, answer and direct phone calls to appropriate people, complete data entry tasks, and help maintain lobby space.

**Food Shelf:** The Marketplace Food Shelf utilizes a "choice model", meaning participants are free to shop just as they do in a traditional grocery store by choosing exactly the food they need from the shelves within Food Shelf guidelines.

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**Food Shelf - Rescue Driver:** Volunteers use the PRISM van to pick up rescue food from our grocery store partners daily. Food donated to PRISM, is nearing expiration or has some blemishes. Donations are returned to PRISM, sorted, and distributed to the participants visiting PRISM.

**Food Shelf - Check In:** Volunteers check in participants visiting the food shelf. This includes checking to see if the participant has utilized PRISM services, connecting them with the right services, and welcoming them to the Food Shelf.

**Shop for Change:** Shop for Change is PRISM's social enterprise. All items are donated, processed, and sold to the community at affordable rates. Volunteers accept donations, sort and price items, display items on sales floor, and are cashiers checking people out at register.

## Wildfire Update

Transitions are on the horizon with the Wildfire congregations as we accompany one another into the years ahead. We are looking to the near and far future together, trusting that God has a plan for our collaboration. Together, the Wildfire congregations are the ELCA presence in the Robbinsdale School District between Highway 169 and Brooklyn Boulevard to the west and east. The southern and northern boundaries are I-394 and I-694 respectively. We are eight **vital** faith communities walking alongside one another for over ten years. Now the Holy Spirit is nudging us to explore new possibilities with hope-filled purpose.

The Wildfire Planning Group was formed in late 2024 to continue building relationships between the congregations and to work strategically towards discovering the ways our congregations might enhance one another. The group is comprised of two lay members invited by the pastors from each of the eight Wildfire congregations: Cross of Glory, Elim, Faith Lilac Way, First of Crystal, Holy Nativity, House of Hope, St James, and Valley of Peace. Deacon Kirsten Kessel (First of Crystal) has begun serving as the Rostered Minister Liaison with the group.

On December 12, 2024, the Wildfire Planning Group met at House of Hope for an initial grounding time. In addition to liaising with the rostered ministers, Deacon Kirsten will accompany and provide guidance to the group, holding the purpose in focus. The team members serve as congregational liaisons grounded in discovering God's preferred future for our congregations individually and together. They will be transparent communicators and apply their gifts and skills to the work of enriching collaborative efforts.

Revelation 21:1-6 was the dwelling scripture for the grounding meeting, which includes, "See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell among them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them.....And the one who was seated on the throne said, 'See, I am making all things new." Despite changes and challenges in our congregations, we can trust that God is always accompanying us and creating anew.

Dean Funk (First of Crystal) illustrated the work like this:

Wildfire includes many individuals within the eight congregations, and each congregation has its own culture. We're aware of a variety of gifts among us, but many more that have yet to be unwrapped. As we deepen our relationships, what resources and opportunities will present themselves? God knows, and the Holy Spirit will aid us in our discovery. Don't we all enjoy opening presents?

The Wildfire Collaborative has combined efforts on Confirmation programming, Vacation Bible School (VBS), youth and adult mission/service trips, special worship services and musical offerings, as well as a shared Parish Nurse, shared seminary intern, and a shared Youth Director. As each congregation has changed, our needs and possibilities are also changing. Our work is to intentionally follow the path God rolls out before us.

It will take time and intention to go together, getting to know each other and appreciating the gifts of each congregation. The best outcomes rely on the participation of all along the way. Your gifts, passions, and skills will be needed too. Watch for opportunities to participate, such as the emerging Wildfire Men's Group, currently meeting every Saturday, 8:30 AM at St James for bible study and conversation.

It is an adventure like sailing across the ocean. We cannot see the end of the horizon or what we may encounter, and the path is not straight. There is no clearly defined or easy way forward. We must journey as the Spirit's wind blows us, tacking along on this adventure into God's preferred future; "I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." Jeremiah 29:11
