A Word from Pastor Ashley

Every October we remember the Reformation. In 1517 Martin Luther posted his Ninety-Five Theses in Wittenberg, sparking a movement that opened the doors of the church wider so that the good news of God's grace could be heard by all. At its heart, the Reformation was about trusting that salvation comes through faith alone, by God's grace alone.

In some ways, we too are living in the midst of what feels like a reformation. Our building is shifting: walls have been painted, floors waxed, upgrades to our HVAC system are in progress, and news from the Lower Level Task Force will be shared soon about next steps. It feels that all throughout the building spaces are being reimagined and refreshed.

Alongside these physical changes, our partnership with All God's Children Discovery Center is reshaping our shared life. And, our newly formed Faith and Neighboring Practices Team is connecting us with other congregations in the Minneapolis Area Synod (look for more information in this VOICE). And this fall, we also step into a new program year, with fresh opportunities for Faith Formation, Music Ministry, and many other congregational events and activities.

MISSION STATEMENT

RECONCILING IN CHRIST STATEMENT

We believe we are all created in God's image and that we are called by Jesus, through the workings of the Holy Spirit for healing, justice, and peace, to reconciliation, service, and care for all of God's beloved community.

THIRD GRADE BIBLE MILESTONE

The Bible Milestone is one of several milestones we do at Valley of Peace throughout a child's faith formation. Milestones include First Communion and Confirmation. The Bible Milestone is a special day for third graders (or those who are past third grade who haven't yet had their milestone) to receive a Bible as a gift from the congregation, learn about how to use it, and then receive a blessing and celebration of them by the congregation as part of worship.

The Third Grade Bible Milestone this year is on Sunday, October 12th. We ask third graders to meet at 9am during Children's Faith Formation and to bring one adult with them to learn about the Bible, do some fun team building games, and more! Then, in the worship service, they will be invited to stand in front as a blessing from the congregation is spoken.

FAITH & NEIGHBORING PRACTICES

Faith & Neighboring Practices is a two-year learning community for congregations in the Minneapolis Area Synod. A key belief behind the program is that vital congregations authentically engage with their neighborhood, trusting that God is already active in the community beyond the church's walls. Faith & Neighboring Practices will guide cohorts of congregations (5-7 congregations in each cohort) as they discern their call to be faithful neighbors in the communities where they live and worship. We will explore practices related to asset-based community development, community engagement, and contemplative spirituality. Pastor Ashley, Laurie Eaton, George Johnson, Pat McGraw and Sara Hoge have agreed to participate in the program. Pastor Ashley, Laurie, George and Pat attended the full day kick off retreat at the Heritage Center in Brooklyn Center on Saturday September 13th. It was a complex, challenging and deeply inspiring experience. The VoP team is extremely excited to lead our congregation through this two-year long journey. The council and congregation will be kept up to date and engaged throughout this journey.

INDIAN BOARDING SCHOOL REMEMBRANCE

One of the Memorials (resolutions from synods) adopted at the recent 2025 Churchwide Assembly outlines a series of actions the church should undertake, "To address the legacies of this church's role in Indian boarding schools." This includes to, "Encourage ministries affiliated with or related to the ELCA to commit to learning the truth of their involvement with Indian boarding schools...and to responsibly create paths to healing and repair."

Not long ago, I was only vaguely aware that Lutheran bodies were involved with Indian boarding schools and that these schools had a destructive impact on the children who attended them. But I had no clear understanding of what this meant in concrete terms.

This recently changed, when a book club I belong to selected a novel written by Native American Mona Susan Power, *A Council of Dolls*. Here, for the first time, I learned in graphic terms what education in these boarding schools looked like. And how this can have not only life-long traumatic impacts for these students, but also how these impacts carry-over to future generations.

The novel begins with the story of a young Native American girl growing up in Chicago in the 1960s. While her mother is a talented and effective leader in the Indian movement, she has also been traumatized by her experiences at an Indian boarding school in the 1930s, which are graphically depicted. This results in periods of deep depression that often lead to violent acts against her daughter. Later in the book we learn that in the 1900s, the young girl's grandmother and grandfather also suffered through the grim realities of an Indian boarding school education. Suddenly the term "generational trauma" took on a real, concrete meaning for me.



WILDFIRE SUMMER VISIONING PROCESS

In June, representatives from all eight Wildfire churches gathered to read the story from Acts 2. We'd all recently celebrated Pentecost Sunday, where we'd read this same story about the Holy Spirit descending upon the disciples as tongues of [wild]fire, empowering them to understand each other's languages, inspiring them with "hopes and dreams," and bringing them together as one church. We believe it is this very Spirit that has been on the move among Wildfire churches for nearly 18 years, drawing us together across the gifts of our differences to be God's church together here in the Robbinsdale School District!

Over the years, our eight churches have shared in many things, including worship, youth programming, service work, fellowship events, staff sharing, and more. The Wildfire Planning Team that began convening after the Wildfire Summit in 2023 has been gathering monthly the past couple of years to help further facilitate various ways of sharing in ministry together.

But the Pentecost story from Acts 2--which affirms a Spirit who is always breathing and blowing and calling us to be church in new ways--calls us to continually listen and look for the ways God is at work. How, in other words, is the Spirit on the move within the Robbinsdale School District today, and how is God calling Wildfire churches to take part in it?

To explore this question, lay leaders from Wildfire churches gathered each month this summer to revisit God's call. We read Bible stories, we shared things we love about our different churches, we talked about where we've seen God, and things that give us hope. Because God's call isn't just about our own "hopes and dreams," we also worked to listen to our neighbors. All participants were invited to have a 1:1 conversation with someone else from their congregation, and with a neighbor in the wider Robbinsdale School District community.

Out of all this work, a clearer sense of God's call began to emerge. We are currently in the midst of finalizing the language around our renewed Wildfire vision. We look forward to sharing it and celebrating it with all the Wildfire congregations soon, and for the ways it will guide and inspire our ongoing work of being church together.

Dear Members of Valley of Peace Lutheran Church,

At Valley of Peace, we believe that every person who walks through our doors should feel safe, seen, and deeply loved. As a congregation that is Reconciling in Christ (RIC) and committed to the ongoing work of racial justice, we understand that being a welcoming community is not only about what we say, it is about how we show up in action, policy, and presence.

In that spirit, we have begun the work of forming a Rapid Response Team to help ensure the safety and dignity of all who worship, work, and gather in our building. This team will help us respond thoughtfully and consistently in situations where the presence or actions of outside authorities and individuals (such as protestors or Immigration and Customs Enforcement or Homeland Security) may threaten the trust and sanctuary we seek to provide.

Here are a few important updates and commitments we are putting into practice as part of this effort which began on Sunday, September 7:

Training will be provided for staff, leaders, and lead ushers (and other members who would like to participate) to help respond with compassion, legal awareness, and clarity in high-stakes situations.

Signage will be place throughout the building to clearly identify safe spaces where only authorized individuals are permitted. These are spaces where those seeking refuge can find protection and peace.

If federal agents, including ICE or Homeland Security, come to our building, we will require a warrant signed by a judge before any access is granted. This is both a legal right and a moral responsibility to protect those who may be vulnerable.

In our worship space, the last two rows of seating on both sides will not be included on the live stream, offering a space for those who wish to worship freely without their presence being broadcast publicly.

This work is not about fear. It is about faith. It is about creating a space where everyone, regardless of race, immigration status, gender identity, or circumstances, knows they are safe and that their dignity is sacred. Jesus taught us to love our neighbor, to stand with the oppressed, and to welcome the stranger. This is one of the ways we are living out that call in real and practical ways.

We will continue to share updates as this work unfolds, and we invite your prayers and support. More information will be shared at Adult Faith Formation this fall.


